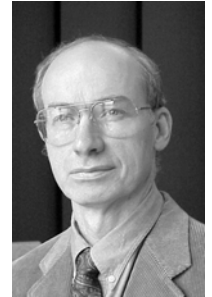

Spring Cleanup in the Park

Residents in the Woodmere community will be gathering for a spring cleanup in the park on March 29, 2008. We will meet at 9:00 AM at the park on Woodmere Drive. Neighbors are asked to bring high spirits, power tools, shovels, rakes, mowers and leaf blowers or any other garden or lawn tool that may come in handy. This is going to be a day to dig in and get dirty. So old work clothes are recommended.

Not only will we work in the park, but we will also concentrate on the common areas (berms, sidewalks, ditches, grass growing in the streets, distractions, and eyesores). We need to identify where new plant growth is needed, so we can plant and refurbish in the fall.



Home Security Tips

The following suggestions may keep your home secure and safe from potential break-ins.

Invest in a home security system.

- Make it a point to know your neighbors. They can be your eyes and ears when you are not at home.
- Get an automated timer for your lights.
- Ask a neighbor to watch your home and to park in the driveway from time to time.
- Do not forget to have mail and newspaper delivery stopped if you will be travelling.
- Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone is home.
- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it is just for a few minutes.
- Trim overgrown shrubbery, which could be a hiding place for burglars.
- Have floodlights or motion-sensitive lighting on for the evening, regardless of whether someone is home or not.

QUARTERLY MEETING
THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 8, 2007
MUSEUM OF FINE ARTS AUDITORIUM**

The Woodmere Neighborhood Association met on Thursday, November 8, 2007 for its quarterly meeting at the Museum of Fine Arts Auditorium. President Sam Whatley called the meeting to order. The invocation was presented by Mrs. Don Drenth. The guest speakers were Councilman Charles Jinright and Michael Vigilant, Chief Operating Officer for the Alabama Shakespeare Foundation.

Councilman Jinright spoke first and reported that the new convention center will be open soon. He expects the center to be one of the best.

Jinright said the Montgomery Police Department is doing its best to combat crime in our city. He stated that he thought our city was in very good condition. He went on to say he was very proud of the WNA and the communications we have with him.

Michael Vigilant said the number of people attending the Alabama Shakespeare Festival has been greater in the last two years. He expects "Peter Pan" to be the biggest show in the theater's history. Mr. Vigilant said the ASF was affiliated with the University of Alabama in teaching theater management. He said the ASF will be working with a Southern Writers Project, The Life of Paul "Bear" Bryant.

The cultural park will begin closing at midnight, and there will be extra security during shows. The park has 24 hour security now.

In the business session, it was announced that the minutes of the August 9th General meeting were published in the newsletter. The minutes were reviewed and approved.

The Treasurer's report was delivered by Sam Whatley. Sam announced that we had several new members that joined during the meeting. Sam also reported we had 150 members for 2007 at the time of the meeting, and we need more members to join before the New Year.

Jimmy Gunn, Parks Committee Chairman, reported that the Day in the Park was very successful. All the vendors did a great job.

In new business, it was announced that the 2008 budget was adopted at the November Board meeting. The budget was the same as the 2007, with the exception of there being no expense for handbooks.

The election of new officers for WNA was opened for nominations. A group of new officers for nomination was presented by the Nominating Committee Chairman, Jimmy Gunn. A motion was made to elect all officers as nominated by the committee. The new officers for 2008 as nominated were affirmed by majority vote of those in attendance.

An open petition letter for a 3-way stop sign at the intersection of Woodmere Boulevard and Woodmere Drive was read by President Sam Whatley. A committee is needed to get the petition started and completed. The petition needs to be done in the next two months.

Sam Whatley reported that crime reports have really decreased in Woodmere within the last year. Crime reports from the Montgomery Police Department can be accessed from the www.WoodmereMontgomery.com web site by clicking on a link.

Jimmy Gunn expressed thanks to the Board of Directors for their work and dedication to the neighborhood and encouraged more new memberships. Jimmy said there should be more participation in caring for the neighborhood and more pride in the neighborhood. He said everyone should take note of the better paving in the park that will be done and better lighting. The pear trees in the park will be replaced, the pond is cleaner and more beautiful, plus the new pond drain is done.

The next General Meeting to be held on January 31, due to scheduling conflicts with the Museum of Fine Arts for the auditorium.
